

Bladder Relaxation Medications

Your child has been prescribed an anti-cholinergic medication to help relax the bladder muscle and decrease bladder spasms and the frequent urge to urinate.

This medication most commonly is used for children who demonstrate symptoms of uninhibited bladder contractions (also known as bladder instability).

You will find listed below some of the common types of these medications. Some medications are 24 hour release and are given just once a day. The other medications are immediate release and are given 2-4 times a day depending on the medication.

It is important to follow the directions on your child's bottle. Sometimes one medication works better for a particular patient than the other. Therefore, we may have to try different medications to achieve the best result for your child.

The following medications are dosed according to the child's weight, the tolerance to the medication, if they can swallow pills, and which medications are covered by your insurances medication formulary.

Ditropan (oxybutynin)
Levsin/Levbid (hyoscyamine)
Detrol LA (tolterodine)
Ditropan XL (oxybutynin ER)

Gelnique Oxytrol

Vesicare (solifenacin)
Enablex (darifenacin)
Sanctura (trospium)
Myrbetrig (mirabegron)

Possible side effects

Constipation
 Dilated pupils
 Nausea
 Dry mouth
 Headache
 Flushed Face
 Vomiting
 Fast Heart Rate

Who should *NOT* take this medication

Patients should not take these types of medications if they have gastrointestinal obstruction, urinary obstruction, ulcerative colitis, glaucoma, myasthenia gravis, or an allergy to the drug.
